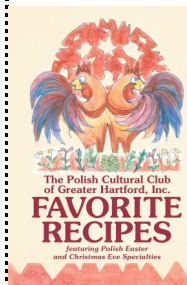


"COLD WAR" — 3 OSCAR NOMINATIONS

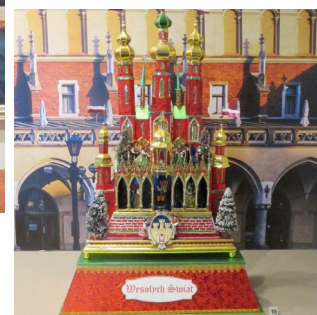

CHRISTMAS IN POLAND EXHIBIT (KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS MUSEUM)

The "Christmas in Poland" exhibit, which ran from November 7, 2018 through February 3, 2019 was an extraordinary success having had well over 10,500 visitors. Member, Marek Czarnecki, gave a lecture/slide presentation on December 15, 2018 on Polish Christmas Customs, which was very well received. It was standing room only on January 13, 2019, when the Moniuszko Choir under the direction of Adrian Sylveen captivated over 900 guests (only 400 were expected) with a concert of Polish *koledy*. Following the event, the PCCGH hosted a reception for the Choir and 25 Club members in attendance. The Exhibit itself was well researched and beautifully presented. Christmas trees decorated with Polish themes by Catholic school students were inspiring.

DO YOU KNOW . . . THE ORIGINS OF THE NAMES OF THE MONTHS — IN POLISH?

We are all familiar with the names of the month identified with the Julian calendar reformed by Julius Caesar in 46 BC, as they are a part of our daily lives. It is interesting, however, to contrast the origin of the months in the Polish language, all of which relate to nature.

MONTHS OF THE JULIAN CALENDAR

January — named for Janus, the Roman god of gates and doorways, depicted with two faces looking in opposite directions.

February — represents the Roman festival of purification, held on February 15.

March — Mars is the Roman god of war. March was the original beginning of the year and the time for resumption of war.

April — Aphrodite's month — the Greek goddess of love and beauty.

May — "Maia" (meaning "the great one") is the Italic goddess of spring.

June — Juno is the principal goddess of the Roman Pantheon and also the goddess of marriage and the well-being of women.

July — In reforming the Roman calendar in 46 BC, Julius Caesar renamed this month after himself.

August — Augustus Caesar clarified and completed the calendar reform of Julius Caesar and in the process renamed this month after himself.

September — Latin for *september mensis* "seventh month."

October — Latin for *october mensis* "eighth month."

November — Latin for *novembris mensis* "ninth month."

December — Latin for *decem* "ten" + *ber* (adj. suffix) or "tenth month."

MONTHS (MIESIĄCE) IN THE POLISH LANGUAGE

Styczeń (January) from *stykać się* — to come together, because that is when the old and new year meet.

Luty (February) an adjective meaning harsh or severe and descriptive of that month's frequently wretched weather.

Marzec (March) from the verb *marznąć* — to freeze over, because of the month's frequent bouts of frost.

Kwiecień (April) suggests things floral because the first blossoms of the year appear.

Maj (May) the only Polish month whose name came from Latin (Maius), from the Roman goddess of spring, Maia; in Polish it has generated the verb *maić* (to festoon with flowers and greenery).

Czerwiec (June) from *czewr*, an insect that appears in June from which red dye was once made, hence the adjective *czzerwony* (red).

Lipiec (July) from *lipa* (linden or lime tree) which blooms in July.

Sierpień (August) from *sierp* (sickle) used in the grain harvest around that time of year.

Wrzesień (September) from *wrzos* (heather), because that is when it is in full bloom.

Październik (October) from *paździerz*, the time of year when flax and hemp are scutched.

Listopad (November) fallen leaves.

Grudzień (December) from *grudy*, clumps of frozen mud typical of that time of year.

On October 10, 2018, **Christine Waszynski**, DNP, APRN, GNP-BC, daughter of member **Mary Marek Hartz**, was a recipient of the Connecticut Nurses Association's Mary Jane M. Williams Award. This award recognizes that nurses specialize and function in multiple arenas that advance the cause of the profession and reflects the composite of a lifetime of service. Christine founded and directed Advance Practice Nursing Associates, Inc. from 1986-2000, which was the first nurse practitioner practice in CT comprised of more than 40 advanced practice nurses providing care to older patients in post-acute care, long-term care, and home care. Nationally, she has led work surrounding delirium identification, prevention, treatment, and management by implementing best practices. She conducted funded research on non-pharmacological measures to bring comfort and prevent cognitive/function decline among frail hospitalized seniors and lectured on many geriatric nursing topics. As President-Elect of the Board of Directors of the American Delirium Society, she assumes office in June 2019.
