One of the most beautiful customs and traditions of the Polish people is the Christmas Eve Supper or "Wigilia." Foods from rivers (fish), woods (mushrooms), field (wheat, poppyseed, and vegetables), and orchards (dried fruits) would have been prepared. Once the first star had been sighted by the children, the father of the household would begin the meal with prayers. He would then break the Opłatek and give each member of the family a piece wishing each good health during the year and a happy holiday.

Following this tradition, the Polish Cultural Club invites all to join in a celebration of this most revered and joyous holiday on Saturday, December 10 at the Polish National Home. A traditional meatless Wigilia feast will be featured along with music, and kolędy.

DID YOU KNOW That the Story Behind "Bluetooth" Has a Connection to Poland?



More than 1,000 years after his death in what is now Poland, a European king whose nickname lives on through wireless technology is at the center of an archaeological dispute. Chronicles from the Middle Ages say King Harald "Bluetooth" Gormsson of Denmark acquired his nickname courtesy of a tooth, probably dead, that looked bluish. One chronicler from the time also says the Viking king was buried in Roskilde, in Denmark, in the late 10th century. But a Swedish archaeologist and a Polish researcher recently claimed in separate publications that they have pinpointed his most probable burial site in the village of Wieikowo, in an area of northwestern Poland that had ties to the Vikings.

Marek Kryda, author of the book "Viking Poland," said that a "pagan mound" that he claims he has located beneath Wiejkowo's 19th-century Roman Catholic church probably holds the king's remains. Kryda said geological satellite images available on a Polish government portal revealed a rotund shape that looked like a Viking burial mound. But Swedish archaeologist Sven Rosborn, says Kryda is wrong because Harald, who converted from paganism to Christianity and founded churches in the area, must have received an appropriate grave somewhere in the churchyard.

Wiejkowo's Church of The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary stands atop a small round knoll. Historians at the Danish National Museum say they are familiar with the "suggestion" that Wiejkowo is Harald's burial place. Rosborn detailed his research in the 2021 book "The Viking King's Golden Treasure," and Kryda challenged some of the Swede's findings in his own book published this year. Harald, who died in 985, probably in Jomsborg — believed today to be the Polish town of Wolin — was one of the last Viking kings to rule over what is now Denmark, northern Germany, and parts of Swe-

den and Norway. He spread Christianity. Swedish telecommunications company Ericsson named its Bluetooth wireless link technology after the king, reflecting how he united much of Scandinavia during his lifetime.

Rosborn, the former director of Sweden's Malmo City Museum, was spurred on his quest in 2014 when an I I-year-old-girl sought his opinion about a small, soiled coin-like object with old-looking text that had been in her family's possession for decades. Experts have determined that the cast gold disc that sparked Maja Sielski's curiosity dated from the 10th century. The Latin inscription on what is now known as the "Curmsun disc" says: "Harald Gormsson (Curmsun in Latin) king of Danes, Scania, Jomsborg, town Al-

dinburg." Sielski's family said the disk came from a trove found in 1841 in a tomb under the Wiejkowo church, which replaced a medieval chapel. Kryda says the Curmsun disc is "phenomenal" with its meaningful inscription and insists that it would be worth examining Wiejkowo as Harald's burial place, but there are no current plans for any excavations.

Polish Christmas Bread for Wigilia

5 eggs 2 tsp. baking powder

2 c. Confectioners' sugar 2 1 /4 c. flour

2 sticks butter or margarine 3 /4 c. finely chopped walnuts

creamed 2/3 c. raisins

3 T. vodka 4 oz. candied orange rind, chopped fine

1 tsp. vanilla extract 1 tsp. cornstarch

1 T. grated lemon rind

Beat the eggs with the sugar for 5 minutes at high speed. Add to the butter or margarine by small portions. Add vodka, vanilla, and lemon rind beating constantly. Add baking powder and flour; beat 5 more minutes. The batter is thick. Mix the nuts, raisins, orange rind, and cornstarch. Combine with the batter. Bake at 350 deg. For 1 hour in a loaf or ring pan which has been buttered and sprinkled with bread crumbs. It is better on the second day. Serve thinly sliced.

ACPC Lapel Pin Committee Chair, Lilia Kieltyka, was charged with coming up with a design and developing an ACPC pin for the general purpose of spreading the organization's name and for gifting purposes among the affiliates. After several drafts, it was decided to use the familiar ACPC eagle and to incorporate red, white, blue, and gold colors. The Committee recognizes Ursula Brodowicz (PCCGH) for the original artwork, Carla Tomaszewski of Poppyfield Press for her graphic artist expertise and consultation, and Dave Motak (editor of the Polish Heritage) for his help with the logo. 300 pins were manufactured through Lapel Pins Plus in Florida and delivered in time to make its debut at the ACPC Convention in San Antonio/Panna Maria this past summer.
